I am sure with the zeal of our Madam will neglect
 what is necessary to be done in the house
 the outside painting. Tell Madam I will not
 get about this daughter when a new maid will
 be required.

You have had I suppose another jinnal meet as I
 hear had experiment and Mr. Pitt's presence went to
 open the boat races at the Upper Lodge. I hope
 George will none be present and keep well with
 the Earl who seems well inclined to the Colonel.
 There has been since the 15th under a decided but
 mid attack of difficulty of breathing and have been
 uncommonly well managed by Dr. Keble. I hope next
 letter will announce my perfect recovery.
