Yours L: ³¹ ~~34~~ and its usual enclos-
 -ures have reached me this morning and I return the
 proper papers signed: I always make a point of
 commencing you by the next Mail and the long and
 severe continuance of Westerly Wind has interrupted
 the communication between the two countries: I
 approve exceedingly of your answer to General Pitt
 Rivers and of your arrangement respecting George
 who has only two Clocks under his charge: nothing
 can be more just: than entirely withdrawing the
 candles and soap from Dimington and Hebb and
 equally correct is the reduction of candles to Padwin:
 the servants have no right to complain and the bills
 will be reduced.

I all (rather I should have thought for the sake of the
 Park Wall near the President's Head Mr. Hardmug
 might have undertaken the French under the river:
 but he must officially apply to President who is
 fully authorized to receive the Park: under the pre-
 sent existing circumstances I suppose for a certain
 time of time or their hands being discharged from the
 Park:

I am glad to find the linen is approved by Mr. Cuth
 and if he will send me the list I will complete the
 entire order for the next I hope sooner to carry over: the
 Dutchess is quite well and desires her compliments:
