

July 1 1804 The King's Ministers having stated to the Prince of

Wales, that it had been represented to them, that the Verbal answers to the Questions addressed to His Majesty's Physicians by the Prince on the 10th of June appeared to have been understood by the Prince, in a Sense different from that which was intended to be conveyed, and having referred the Prince to the Physicians themselves for the true meaning of those answers.

The Prince has again called upon the King's Physicians to attend him, to know from them, whether the Notes which as soon as they had left the room the Prince set down opposite to each Question as in the enclosed Paper contain the Substance of their Answers, or in what Respect they were misunderstood by the Prince.

To this Question, The Prince desires to have a Written Answer.
