Send this and my letter to Lord
Pembroke express by my servant: enclosed is a
copy of my letter to his Lordship: I really want
wants to express what I feel: I carried the French
King of France back with complete and unimpaired
satisfaction: I have been equally selected to
bring to this country the allied monarchs and I
know I have executed this service to the honour
and dignity of the Prince Regent of the country.

a naval review is ordered and the ships are coming
in hourly and get at such a moment - and I the
Admiral of the Fleet and the brother of the
Prince of Wales ordered to haul my Flag down:
I must and do feel this unnecessary indignity:
I hope and trust my brother will protect me and
relieve my wounded mind by ordering my Flag
to continue flying which I will not haul down
till I hear from you as well as Lord Pembroke.
I am ever yours however dearly and kindly. I do
feel this cruel treatment which I really do
