that I perfectly understand his aversion to pub-  
- lic Bulletins and I can very easily conceive  
the various duties you must have to perform  
sometimes distract your mind. However it is  
but justice to yourself to believe that your  
- sense and discretion have been your guides  
and the best proof of these facts is the universal  
silence about your speech and his confinement.  
- Your duty to the King is in the  
Court and not in public and you have rigidly  
- to my observation adhered to this rule.
